Our culture today values consumerism, crowds, parades, and gaudiness. The bigger the light display in one's yard, the better. The best deal is always the lowest price. The finest tree is one covered until you no longer see the boughs, but the glitter and sheen. And the best meal is the one where we gather and stuff ourselves into a comatose state of sleepiness.

We need Advent. A time of quiet in the hustle and bustle. A season of focus and expectation. A remembrance of what is and what will become. A reminder of the real reason for the season. ### **Finance News**

Thank you for your continued financial support to the church. Your support means we can pay our bills and salaries so that we can continue to function soundly during and after quarantine times. However, as you can see from the report below, we need your continued financial support.

We received \$12,89200 in October and had expenditures of \$19,813.34 for a \$6,921.34 shortfall. For the year through October 30, we have a shortfall of \$30,446.58. November figures are incomplete as of this date but deposits are much better. We are working on the 2021 budget and hope to reduce the budget considering current COVID conditions and the effect it may have in the future.


### FOOD PANTRY NEWS

### Trustee News

List of things to do at the Church and Parsonage has been put together and some of the items can be done by volunteers in the membership, while many need a professional's touch. The Trustees decided that painting the railings around the building black, painting the hallway, land-scape work were things that could be done by volunteers. Although the hallway should wait until after we get the leaking downspout taken care of, as it is causing the newly repaired plaster to bubble, again. Another thing would be to begin the process of replacing the blinds, first in the nursery, with cordless, 2-inch wide white wood-looking blinds.

The Parsonage had a section of the eave in front of the building repaired, by J.R. Weldon. He has also been hired to fix the doorway on the brickwork housing the massive HVAC unit, and to repair the termite damage to the shed. He is also looking at repairing/replacing the section of copper downspout that is leaking onto the brick wall in the courtyard.

New dishwasher was installed at the Parsonage. I fully expect that the stove will be replaced in 2021.

Springs on the main garage door opener were purchased and then replaced by Tom Thrasher.

<u>An arborist has been hired</u> to take down trees, and trim trees, at both properties. The holly on Hicks Street, and the hollies at Lamar and Main Street will be taken down. This is due to the roots growing under the building and pushing outward on the wall. The hollies in the courtyard will be trimmed down about 5 feet, and away from the building. The magnolias will be trimmed away from the building, and the holly in the center of the courtyard will be removed. The crepe myrtles will be cut back. At the Parsonage, in the front yard there are at least 4 trees that will be taken out. In the back, the gardens will be cleaned out of plants that weren't meant to be there.

The Trustees sent in a budget request, reminding the Finance Committee of how much we should have asked for, if we were following the "1% rule for maintenance".
