

Wednesday NIGHTS are BACK! (again)






Youth for Wednesday NIGHTS

Memorial still NEEDS YOU!


The following shows the amount of budget money we have received and our expenditures through August as well as year-to-date figures. As you can see, we did well in August, but still lag for the year.

Trustees Meeting Notes

Aug. 9, 2021

Present: Betty Sellers, Steven Combs, Charles Price, Nancy Thrasher and Scott Wilks

We discussed replacing the gasket for the freezer in the kitchen or buying a new one. Because money is 'tight', we are replacing the gasket, to extend the life of the current unit. Charles Price took this project. There is a hinge on the back that needs to be repaired or replaced. This will be paid for from the designated "Kitchen Committee" funds.

We hired a painter to paint the halls, stairwells and kitchen for \$4,767.50, which would come out our designated funds. The shade of cream on the walls is being matched. All halls will be the same color.

The committee voted to break the job into 3 parts:

- 1. The Foyer, Stairwell and Hallway. This will be done the week of August 30th.
- 2. The Kitchen, Stairwell and first floor hallway will be done in September.
- 3. The back stairwell will be done in October.

Fire inspection indicated covers missing from 3 old relay boxes from our currently unused steam system. No power was active in any of the three boxes. Covers were fabricated to close these boxes and were marked inactive and dated. One additional box appeared to have power but it's use and ultimate destination was not determined. The original cover was replaced and marked as active (because it was covered the fire inspection did not note this box. During this task some light bulbs were replaced in the basement with one more that needs additional work to replaced.

The Trustees could really use your help:

As of 2 weeks ago, we no longer have anyone mowing the church grounds, and we are paying Pro-cuts to mow every other week at the Parsonage. If you know of someone who could mow, or if you want to volunteer to help keep our lawn mown, please email Nancy Thrasher at <u>thrashernl@msn.com</u> A big shout out to John Jones and Bill Stone for their work to get the lawn ready for the Smith-Chang wedding on August 29th.

Nancy will also be buying brick sealant to put on the building trouble spots around the lower half of the outer brick wall. If you have a sprayer, and can help, please email Nancy Thrasher at <u>thrashernl@msn.com</u> She is hoping to take care of this project on Saturday, September 11, beginning at 9 a.m.

Lastly, the Trustees are entrusted with the upkeep of the properties, and to that end, I believe we are making a dent in the many projects that require our attention. Our building and grounds are valued at \$3,400,000.00. Building maintenance budgets should run between 2% - 5%, therefore, we should be spending between \$68,000.00 and \$170,000.00 on our property maintenance. The Trustees are allotted \$10,000.00 minus the cost of mowing, testing the fire extinguishers and gas for the mower, plus replacement lighting tubes, for building maintenance. Everything else is paid for through funds that you have designated towards a project, i.e. building and grounds, landscaping, kitchen, Sanctuary, Trustees General Fund, etc.

There are some big projects coming up during the next 3 to 10 years:

Replace the H/AC unit next to the building. Bids will be asked for in mid-September. Most of this project will be paid for with the remaining funds from the Eager estate.

Replacing the gutters and downspouts.

Updating the bathrooms, the kitchen, the Fellowship Hall and remodeling the kitchen

Repair or replace the windows in the Sanctuary. So far, it looks like cost per window is running at \$10,500.00 to repair each window in the sanctuary. Replacing each window runs around \$11,400.00 per window. Savings from doing this would be seen in our Heating and Air Conditioning costs. Currently we are paying between \$250.00 to \$275.00 each Sunday, just to air condition the Sanctuary.

We are at a point where very difficult decisions about the building need to be made. Prayerfully consider this, and ask God to guide our Trustees during this challenging time.

As your pastor, I would like to share some of the financial concerns and challenges we have tried to communicate over the last month. The last thing any pastor wants to address is finances. I thank God for such an adept and passionate financial team at our church. They do wonders.

July (as it often does) was not our best giving month. When faced with a deficit between our income and our expenditures, passionate people start to get nervous. The truth is that we expect that drop in the Summer and yet it seems to surprise us all the same. People travel. People spend time away with families or out in nature. Attendance is lower and giving as well.

But while giving and attendance goes down in summer months, utilities go up. Salaries stay the same. Ma Bell want's her cut as does CUB. And we have a beautiful old building that costs a lot to heat and cool. We're constantly checking doors, lights and thermostats to trim costs. I also know that this is a wonderful church who loves this old building.

Our trustees were left a sizeable amount from an estate this year. A God-send. It allows us to do some past due projects that needed to be done. Paint here, carpet there. Wall repairs. Plumbing repairs. The list seems to go on forever and never gets shorter. Our air conditioning units are way out of their life expectancy so we hope that when the time comes, we will have that reserve, designated money to replace them. Thank you, Nancy Thrasher for your good stewardship.

The Food Pantry continues on. We are transitioning back to evening hours (like old times) 5:30-6:30pm on the first and third Thursdays of each month, starting September 2nd. We have almost completely re-stocked the Pantry with food goods as well as household items such as toilet paper, paper towels and cleaners. In the meantime, we are busy packing bags of food for the next pantry. We are attempting to make this a drive-thru event so that recipients don't have to come in the church. Thank you Memorial UMC for your continued support, and the volunteers who help us each and every time. We appreciate you so much!


