Thanks so much for the support in 2021. The BeAttitudes had fun celebrating the Kings Birthday.



MEMORIAL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH MINISTRIES REPORT FOR 2021

A grateful heart is a loving heart. The 21 Acts of Love Program this year reminded us that God's love in our hearts requires intentional action and service. And we have responded accordingly, accepting the challenges of a year of pandemic recovery. We have evidenced giving, caring, praying, and serving hearts.

First, we have just cooperatively demonstrated it with two major projects. The churchwide Christmas project of helping seniors through the Senior Citizens Program of Anderson County resulted in a financial giving of <u>\$2,583.00</u> as well as an abundance of requested gifts to meet their specified needs. The UMCOR offering to help serve the victims of the tragic storms in Kentucky and West Tennessee was <u>\$2,270.00</u>. Especially this Christmas as we look at the stark needs of people served in both projects reminds us of just how blessed we are. Response to the needs occurring because of a flood early in the fall, resulted in an offering of <u>\$1202.00</u> being sent to the Methodist Church in Waverly, TN. In addition, many members *all year* have been quietly serving in the community and in the church in many kinds of situations. One of the greatest gifts we are giving to others is a caring, supportive relationship developed as we give our time through activities such as listening, visiting, transportation needs, direct service, companionship, visits, food, cards, etc. An active prayer chain and a phone ministry to shut ins intentionally involved many of our elderly members. A pilot tutoring program, assisting four third graders from Clinton Elementary Students, has been initiated with nine adult volunteers, many of which are retired and active educators from our membership. It is going well.

Gratitude was expressed to the Anderson County Health Department through a special offering that funded and provided two meals served to employees as they tirelessly immunized the community against COVID in cold, rainy, snowy weather this past winter. In the conference global mission bucket project, we gave the highest number of buckets per membership of any church in the conference. Twenty families accepted the challenge to adopt a child through Compassion International. Previously established, the ministries of the Ida Gamble Scholarship, the Food Pantry, and Funeral dinners remain active. One of the couples of our church passed out packages of hot chocolate during the downtown Christmas parade. Some members are carrying care packages in their cars to distributed to the homeless when an opportunity presents itself.

We expect this coming year to be even more impactful as each of us accept the challenge of being a minister of our church. It must be emphasized that this list does not include all the service given to the church and church activities. These were chosen from activities communally or individually performed within the three committees defined as ministry – Missions, Evangelism, and Outreach. Let each of us actively seek the activity of God and the help of the Holy Spirit in all the situations we encounter, and gratefully thank Him for each of those blessings. Let us actively encourage others to join (rejoin) us regularly in all the programs of the church as our hearts are filled with gratitude for all that Jesus has done for us. Our prayer is that our service will glorify our heavenly Father as His light shines through us to the world to make a difference in the life of someone else.


